Confirmed keynote speakers for SPT 2009 are Nick Bostrom, the Director of the Future of Humanity Institute at Oxford University and the co-founder of the World Transhumanist Association and the Institute for Ethics and Emerging Technologies, and Andrew Feenberg, who is Canada Research Chair in Philosophy of Technology at Simon Fraser University.

As you know, our biennial conference is the best opportunity we have for connecting with one another face to face across the spectrum of our varied and shared interests. But, because as a society we only meet every other year, we particularly need to take advantage of other ways of connecting with one another. Along these lines, for some time we have talked about having a member directory for SPT. Now with the transition to a new year, in the grand spirit of new year's resolutions, it is high time to make this directory a reality.

In the directory, you will be listed along with your institutional contact information, including address, phone number, e-mail address, and website (if you have one). Techné: Research in Philosophy & Technology, the journal of the Society for Philosophy and Technology, is currently welcoming submissions of all styles and approaches in philosophy of technology. The editorial stance of *Techné* is ideologically neutral. There is, however, a unifying theme: a focus on technology, particular technologies, modern or traditional, worldwide, or on social and ethical problems associated with particular technologies. *Techné* aims at being the platform for presenting novel developments and results in academic research on this theme. We therefore seek rigorous, seminal, interesting, creative work and eagerly solicit work from those in fields outside philosophy as long as they offer philosophical perspective.

Submissions will be blind refereed by at least two readers. It is our expectation that authors will be provided with critiques, where, in the judgment of the editors they are deemed helpful. We also seek to have a turn-around time of two months, although this is subject to the cooperation of our referees. We construe philosophy of technology broadly, and we are dedicated to fostering the highest standards in what is becoming a diverse field of study. Papers will be accepted on the basis of a submitted abstract, which will be refereed. An abstract must be between 500 and 750 words in length (references excluded) and submitted via email (spt2009@utwente.nl) as embedded plain text or an attachment in RTF or WORD (no docx) or PDF format. It should also contain the name and number of the track to which the abstract is submitted. Abstracts must be submitted no later than January 5, 2009. Authors will be informed of the decision of the referees by March 15, 2009.

Panel Proposals

We will also accept proposals for panel discussions, also to be submitted by January 31, 2009. Panel proposals must include a statement of the general topic and an overview of the specific questions or issues to be addressed. In addition, the proposal should include a list of the panelists involved, their expertise in this area, and whether they have indicated that they are willing to participate.

The SPT conference series is recognized as the premier international event in philosophy of technology, with delegates from all over the world. Conferences are held every 2 years, alternating between Europe and the United States. SPT 2009 is the 16th conference in the series.

4. Call for Invitations to Host SPT 2011

The SPT Board of Directors invites proposals to host the SPT meeting in 2011. Following past practice, it is anticipated that this meeting will take place in North America, but invitations to host SPT 2011 in other locations are also welcome.

Invitations should include the following details:

- A brief description of your institution and why it would be a good choice for this meeting.



- Anticipated conference dates.
- Anticipated number of registrants.
- Travel information: What airport will conference participants use? Are there direct flights to this airport from major US and international cities? How far is the airport from the conference location? Will the host institution arrange transportation from the airport, or will participants be responsible for getting to the venue on their own?
- A description of the facilities available for the conference. How many rooms will be available for our use? What is their seating capacity? Where will group meals take place?
- Lodging information: How many rooms will be available for conference participants? What will be the anticipated costs of the lodging? Will lodging be on or off campus? If off-campus, how far away, and will transportation be available for participants to get from their lodging to the campus?
- An estimate of the conference registration fee, and a description of the costs to be included in it.
- A budget estimate, including a detailed breakdown of institutional and other expenses (eg keynote speakers, group educational/social activities, etc.). Please provide an explanation of how the costs will be covered, including anticipated revenue from registration fees, amount needed from the society, and institutional support. (All budgetary information should be given in US dollars.)
- A letter of commitment of institutional support is encouraged to accompany the invitation.

Invitations to host SPT 2011 may be sent to Diane Michelfelder at any time, but preferably no later than 15 May 2009. Invitations may be submitted electronically (to michelfelder@macalester.edu) or by surface mail to the Department of Philosophy, Macalester College, 1600 Grand Avenue, Saint Paul, Minnesota 55105-1899 USA. The SPT Board will consider the proposals received at their next meeting; and it is anticipated that the host institution will be announced at the conference in Enschede. Preliminary expressions of interest, requests for a sample proposal, or any general questions should be directed to Diane at the e-mail address above or at 1-651-696-6197.

5. Workshop on Philosophy and Engineering 2008

The second international Workshop on Philosophy of Engineering (WPE), held in co-operation and affiliation with the Society for Philosophy and Technology and other professional organizations, took place at The Royal Academy of Engineering in London from November 10th-12th 2008. This was the second WPE, following a successful meeting at the Technical University of Delft in 2007. There were nearly 90



participants in the workshop, from across Europe, the US, China, India and Brazil. Nearly all of those attending played an active part, with 46 contributed papers, 8 posters, 4 keynote speakers and a series of 'tutorials' in which work by established researchers was introduced to participants working in different areas.

Opening the workshop, Billy V. Koen of the University of Texas gave the talk 'Towards a Philosophy of Engineering: An Engineer's Perspective'. Koen set out his view of the nature of engineering, a necessary precursor, he argued, for establishing a philosophy of engineering. According to Koen, the engineering method consists in 'the use of heuristics to cause the best change in an uncertain situation within the available resources'. Koen also offered an engineer's perspective on the nature of philosophy and how this relates specifically to the philosophy of engineering.

Jerome Ravetz of the James Martin Institute at the University of Oxford, and the second keynote speaker at the workshop, spoke on 'Maintenance as Morality'. Ravetz's talk addressed the essential importance of maintenance to engineering, which is necessary to ensure that engineered products function as intended, in a safe way. However, the criticality of maintenance contrasts with the relatively low status of maintenance activity and the people who carry it out.

Deborah G. Johnson of the University of Virginia gave a talk titled 'An STS-informed account of Engineering Ethics', and set out a case for using the tools and concepts developed within science and technology studies to better understand the ethical responsibility of engineers. By this means, a better appreciation of the relationship between engineers and society can be established. Carl Mitcham of the Colorado School of Mines set out his views on 'The Philosophical Weakness of Engineering as a Profession'. Mitcham argued that unlike philosophically strong professions such as medicine and law, engineering does not have an established set of goals that are embedded in the way that it is taught and practised. His provocative argument was that engineering was more like business in this respect, a conclusion that provoked lively debate.

These keynote lectures were complemented by contributed talks on a wide range of highly stimulating topics. The kinds of issues that proved most fruitful in generating philosophical discussion included the approach and methods of systems engineering; philosophical and ethical questions arising out of software engineering; engineering education for the current era; and the nature of philosophy of engineering. The contributed papers encouraged lively debate both in the lecture halls and throughout the breaks.

WPE 2008 introduced tutorials for participants, an opportunity to hear from experts in various fields about their work and how it relates to philosophy of engineering. Tutorial topics covered US and UK approaches to innovative engineering education; the application of metaphysics to practical engineering; learning about consciousness through the engineering of intelligent systems; peace engineering; feminism and engineering; and the nature of sociotechnical systems. As the philosophy of



engineering is an emerging subject, these were invaluable opportunities to share work that has been carried out by individuals and research groups worldwide.

Plans are now being formed for the WPE 2010. 2008 was a success in bringing together philosophers and engineers in academia. The challenge for the next conference is to include more practising engineers to give their perspective on the reality of engineering method and to discuss with philosophers those aspects of their work that they find philosophically interesting. The aim of WPE is to ensure that the exploration of philosophy and engineering maintains a focus on the real-world application of engineering and the philosophical issues to which it gives rise.

The Philosophy of Identity in the Virtual

Symposium 6, April 23, 9-12 AM / 2-5 PM

Difference, Relation and Identity are three notions that are fundamentals for the success of Virtual Reality technologies (VR and AR). The aim of this symposium is to conceptualise the Identity of an individual as a scientific concept whilst acknowledging the fact that Identity cannot be studied without considering the other two notions. The pros and cons of designing identities for or within VR become obvious upon admitting that representing any Self will be interpreted at some point by someone having his own values, opinions and experience in life. Members of our society that self-procure, attribute or redistribute Identity in the Virtual World bring about psychological enquiries in relation to user intentionality, specific uses of VR applications or general modifications to our ways of communicating. Usability issues addressing the problem of Identity have not yet been integrated into long-term visions of society and our needs. The Chair of the session is thus open to all existential, ethical and epistemological issues having to do with Identity in Virtual Communities.

Special Issue of *Hypatia*: A Journal of Feminist Philosophy Medical Biotechnologies

Edited by Marin Gillis and Inmaculada de Melo-Martín

Medical biotechnologies have been heralded as both the solution to most problems affecting human beings and their environments, and as a threat to all that matters to us. Feminist analysis of current medical biotechnologies has much to offer to this debate. *Hypatia: A Journal of Feminist Philosophy* invites submissions that use feminist philosophy to evaluate medical biotechnologies.

Articles exploring feminist philosophical analyses of medical biotechnologies and those evaluating how feminist values might shape the development and implementation of such technologies are welcome. Also of interest are essays reflecting on the gendered, race, and class dimensions of medical biotechnologies, those evaluating the impact of globalization on these biotechnologies and vice-versa, and articles offering new insights into the effects of medical biotechnologies on social and political arrangements.

Although feminist work in biomedicine is frequently assumed to be about women's capacity to procreate, this issue seeks to highlight other dimensions of medical biotechnologies, including human genetic modification, cloning, xenotransplantation, chimeras, pharmacogenomics/genetics, and human genetic databases.

Papers should be no more than 8000 words, inclusive of notes and bibliography, prepared for anonymous review, and accompanied by an abstract of no more than 100 words. Please provide a cover letter identifying your paper as a submission for the special issue "Medical Biotechnologies." The deadline for submissions is 15 March 2009.
